Just something to think about as Thanksgiving approaches and you pull out the platters and turkey basters.

If our animal kingdom has seen flux, so too have the demographics of Seabrook Island changed. Where once we glimpsed primarily walkers, joggers, and bikers, we now see rollerblades and kids of all ages whizzing by on scooters and skateboards. 1. South Carolina Historical Society Museum Tuesday, Feb. 11 9:00-1:00Leader: Lvnn

South Carolina's extensive historical archives and annals are once again on display in the newly renovated and reopened Robert Mills' "Fireproof Building", a National Historic Landmark Building. The impressive Fireproof Building's unique method of construction is considered to be the oldest in the nation. The building initially opened in December 1826; its recent renovation keeps much of it as it was.

Individual galleries with themed exhibits display multiple aspects that have shaped the state and nation. From artifacts including Francis Marion's powder horn, to an 1855 daguerreotype, to galleries featuring natural disasters (for example: the Earthquake of 1886, complete with photographs), to touchscreens for learning about several South Carolinians' artistic impacts, to cuisine, to Gullah culture; the extensive displays will enchant even the most diverse group of museum goers. This new SINHG trip is unique because we will be touring the museum on a Monday, a day when the museum is actually closed. After our museum led tour, we are then permitted to go back into the galleries to see it over again at our leisure. Afterwards, an optional lunch at a nearby restaurant is planned

Ellen Coughlin originated it years ago and ever since we've had tons of requests to repeat it. In the interim, BMW shut down its factory tour while they implemented a new line. The tour is once again up and running and we're delighted to offer it. Our day begins with a self-guided visit to the Zentrum Museum where we'll see numerous BMW milestones in both touring and racing vehicles, and view rare and important automobiles from BMW's past: the Isetta bubble car, BMW motorcycles, and art cars featuring designs by Andy Warhol, Roy Lichtenstein among others. Lunch is on your own in the museum café. Afterwards we'll board a shuttle bus to take us to the 2-hr. factory tour, where we'll see cars being assembled both manually & robotically. 4. Charleston Harbor Pilots

9:00 - 1:00 Tuesday, Feb. 25 Leader: Lynn M Charleston is home to the eighth largest container trade in the country. The Charleston branch pilots provide services to all vessels engaged in domestic and foreign trade entering and leaving Charleston harbor. The pilots handle vessels calling on Charleston's five Ports Authority Terminals: 7 private cargo terminals, 2 shipyards, 2 Federal Government facilities, and 3 marinas. State law requires a pilot on all foreign and US vessels with a draft greater than 11 feet. Pilots board via rope ladder approximately 15 miles offshore and give orders to steer the vessel through the harbor to its appropriate berth. They board departing vessels to provide the same service in reverse. This is a highly dangerous and specialized job. You'll meet some of the men in this select group (though there has been at least one woman applicant), watch a power-point presentation, and tour the Harbor Pilot building. This trip—one of our best— is a favorite with Seabrookers, and we are pleased to run it again.

Charleston's "West Side Story" begins within the old walled city, viewing impressive public buildings and lovely churches. Outside this walled area –to the west– on low, marshy, undesirable land, a different, darker part of the city's history unfolded. Our tour guide Carol Ezell-Gilson will weave a journey that leads west to the block of misery for the "unfortunates", revealing the underside of the city and giving visitors a more complete understanding of Charleston's history. This area was set aside in 1680 to house Charles Town's charitable, penal and reform institutions and designated as burial ground for poor blacks. By 1738, a combination poor house/work house/insane asylum/jail occupied part of these public lands. The tour concludes amidst large Victorian mansions built on sites of these earlier structures destroyed by the Great Fire of 1861. Tour will start at Washington Park behind City Hall at Broad and Meeting Streets and end at Burbages Grocery on the corner of Broad and Savage. Folks can get a drink or have lunch there, or just rest before walking back to Washington Park, Moderate walking on uneven sidewalks.

16. Cape Romain Lighthouse Tour

Four times each year, Cape Romain National Wildlife Refuge offers a tour to Lighthouse Island where you can view two historic lights. The event begins with a presentation on the history of the two lighthouses at the Sewee Visitor and Environmental Education Center. Following the presentation, participants will drive to McClellanville boat landing and board the Coastal Expeditions Ferry to travel to Lighthouse Island. Winding 6 miles offshore through the estuary to the island is part of the adventure. Skilled naturalists will provide interpretation of the flora and fauna that surrounds the boat enroute to the destination. The lights are a significant maritime landmark and are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The 1827 lighthouse is the oldest of its kind still standing in the U.S. This is an incredible outdoor adventure for people of all ages (children welcome!), that combines a fun-filled boat eco-tour seeing wildlife including birds and possibly dolphins, with exploration of the lighthouses. Please note, you will depart the boat onto the island using a ramp. Once on the island, you'll walk to the lighthouses and be able to enter one of the structures. You may need to walk through marsh, so if you have limited mobility or do not want to walk through the marsh, you may stay on the boat. Be sure to dress in layers, wear shoes or rubber boots that will stay on your feet in pluff mud, a hat and synthetic clothing which dries faster than cotton. Bring water, snacks, sunscreen & insect repellent.

It offers spectacular birding and wildlife viewing. This paddle will take you through the upper section of the creek into the Francis Marion National Forest. This is pristine, undeveloped forest with 1,000-year-old Cypress trees.

Caponata: traditional Sicilian sweet and sour antipasto with eggplant, fennel, capers and golden raisins

- Arancini: rice balls stuffed with mozzarella and meat ragû then fried to a crisp.

Beidler Forest, an 1,800-acre Audubon preserve, sits within the Four Holes Swamp, a huge matrix of black water sloughs, shallow bottomland, hardwoods, deep bald cypress and tupelo gum flats. Here, ancient trees, an abundance of wildlife. and the quiet flow of black water lure photographers and nature lovers from all over. We've timed our visit to coincide with peak songbird migration. In particular, the forest is perfect habitat for migrating Prothonotary warblers which should be in abundance—so much, that sometimes watching fellow birders with their huge telescopic camera lenses is almost as much fun as watching the birds! Our morning begins with a brief orientation at the visitor center, followed by a guided tour along a 1.75-mile wheelchair accessible boardwalk. Walking is easy and there are many stops along the way. Lunch is not included but there are picnic tables under the trees and we encourage you to pack something to eat. Wear comfortable shoes and clothing; be sure to bring binoculars and cameras. Pack bug spray, although the gently flowing black water keeps most flying insects at bay.

42. Charles River Labs (Horseshoe Crabs)

Every spring hundreds of thousands of Atlantic Horseshoe Crabs travel to the beaches and tidal pools of the Low Country to spawn. During this 2-3 month period, these crabs are collected, taken to the Charles River Labs in West Ashley where they "donate" about 30% of their baby blue blood and then they are returned to the water. This is all done because the Horseshoe Crab's copper based blood has properties, which can detect mere traces of bacterial presence and trap them in inescapable clots. Every injectable drug certified by the FDA must be tested using LAL (Limulus amebocyte lysate), as do surgical implants such as pacemakers and prosthetic devices. Join us for a tour of the Charles River Labs to view how the crabs are processed. We last did this trip in the Spring of 2017 and it was a tremendous hit. Tour attendees should wear comfortable shoes - no heels please, ladies.
